3.1 Sewage Sludge Minimisation

Resolved

That the Strategy and Policy Committee:

- 1. Receive the information.
- 2. Note that the preferred option is estimated at \$185m, which is a substantial increase from the placeholder in the 2018 LTP of \$30m.
- 3. Note that officers will present these costs alongside other investment options during the Long Term Plan process to enable Councillors to make strategic choices.
- 4. Note that officers intend to commission an independent review of WWL's advice.
- 5. Note that officers will provide further advice on engagement and consultation, particularly with local communities.
- 6. Note the relationship to the future of the Southern Landfill. Note the interdependency of sludge with the operation of the Southern Landfill, and that significant waste minimisation, or scaling down of the Southern Landfill, cannot be effected until the interdependency is uncoupled.
- 7. Note that as part of preparing a detailed business case, Wellington Water Limited and officers will arrange for a workshop with Councillors prior to the end of 2020 that will

include:

- a. A cost benefit analysis of the preferred option, with comparison to the next two preferred options and the status quo;
- b. Sensitivity analysis of the phased versus non-phased investment of the preferred option;
- c. Sensitivity analysis around the price of carbon;
- d. Sensitivity analysis around sludge volumes based on Planning for Growth assumptions;
- e. Inflation adjusted costs;
- f. Prospects for partnering with third parties, such as Mana Whenua, the private sector, or the Crown;
- g. Advice on the opportunities and challenges of adopting de-centralised wastewater systems, both now and in the future.
- 8. Note that officers will proactively release the Sludge Minimisation Concept Design Report September 2020.
- 9. Note that officers will provide a report on the impacts of the reduction and eventual removal of sludge and life of the landfill in early 2021

3.2 Draft Cemeteries Management Plan 2020

Moved Councillor Fitzsimons, seconded Councillor O'Neill, the following motion

Resolved

That the Strategy and Policy Committee:

- 1. Receive the information.
- 2. Approve the draft *Cemeteries Management Plan, Mākara, Karori and Tawa Cemeteries* (Attachment 2) with the following amendments, and agree that it will be released for public consultation pursuant to section 82 of the Local Government Act 2002:
- Amend section 3.2.2.2 by adding the following new policy as the first of the policies here:
 - 1. All existing interments are regarded as being in perpetuity unless the deed to the plot says differently.
- Amend section 3.2.2.2, policy 4, as follows
 - (4) Continue to sell pre-purchased plots, subject to the right of burial being limited to 50 years from the date of purchase if the plot remains unused.
- Amend Section 3.2.2.2 by amending Action (a) and splitting into two actions as follows:
 - a) Offer, as a trial over the next ten years, Investigate the option of buying non-perpetual rights of interment to burial and ash plots subject to investigating and developing and develop proposed terms and conditions, including:
 - The period of non-perpetual right and appropriate location
 - Options on how the disinterred remains will be treated (e.g. cremated, bones held in an ossuary (see Appendix I, Glossary)
 - Options to offer ashes, headstones and plaques back to families and what will happen if families do not want them or cannot be traced
 - Options for families to re-purchase the right of interment for a further non-perpetual period
 - Options to offer re-purchase <u>for re-use</u> of the plot to family members first
 - The requirements for interment records, including photographic, to be kept permanently
 - Developing an application form and a deed of right of interment for re-useable plots.
 - b) <u>Subject to Council approval of the proposed terms and conditions, offer the option to those buying a new burial or ash plot, of choosing a non-perpetual</u>

right of interment, as a trial until the next review of this management plan,

Amend the explanation under 3.2.2.2 as follows:

There are issues associated with perpetual burial rights. Although the purchaser or descendants are responsible for the plot's maintenance, most families eventually cease to maintain the graves. Yet, for the price of the one-off fee, the Council remains responsible for maintaining access to the grave in perpetuity (as required by statute) and gradually takes on a role in maintaining the grave as time passes (section 3.2.2.4). Inevitably, cemeteries containing plots in perpetuity become full and more land must be found. Suitable land can be difficult to find (see section 3.1.2.2). So, to increase future capacity and more sustainably manage cemetery land over time, the Council is proposing to investigate an option whereby people can purchase a plot knowing that it will be re-used after a specified period. In a small recent survey about 41% of respondents strongly or partially supported the idea, which indicates that there would be uptake of such plots. Overseas examples of non-perpetual rights of interment will be researched in developing proposed terms and conditions. All existing interments are regarded as being in perpetuity unless the deed to the plot says differently.

• Amend Section 6, Implementation to reflect the above changes as follows:

Sectio	n Action
3.2 Cu	ıstomer service
a.	Investigate the option of buying non-perpetual rights of interment to burial and ash plots and develop proposed terms and conditions.
b.	Subject to Council approval of the proposed terms and conditions, offer, as a trial until the next review of this management plan, the option of buying non-perpetual rights of interment to burial and ash plots.

Amend policy 3.2.2.3 (4) (b) to be consistent with Rule 5.3.2, as follows:

- 4. Allow tributes and decorations to be placed on the headstone and associated concrete beam of a gravesite in a lawn cemetery area (see Appendix I, Glossary) and on non-lawn gravesites at Karori and Tawa Cemeteries, provided they do not:
 - a. encroach on or obstruct access to any other plot or communal area;
 - b. require power supplied by the cemetery or from batteries electricity, whether from cemetery power supply system, battery or solar sources;
 - c. disturb the tranquillity of the cemetery environs or cause offence to others.

Amend policy 3.3.3.3 (1) as follows:

1. Permit the personalised design of monuments, including the placement of QR codes, within

the Council's size specifications and the specifications of the New Zealand Standard for Headstones and Cemetery Monuments.

Amend 4.3.5 Action (a) as follows:

- a) Investigate, in consultation with the funeral sector <u>and Greater Wellington Regional</u> <u>Council</u>, the adequacy of the existing transport service to and from Mākara Cemetery, awareness of the service, and options for an increased service if required.
- 3. Delegate to the Chief Executive Officer and Community Well-Being Portfolio Leader the authority to approve minor wording, formatting and content changes as agreed by the Strategy and Policy Committee.
- 4. Note that consultation will be open for a period of five weeks. On completion of this period, submissions will be heard by the Strategy and Policy Committee. Officers will then prepare a final *Cemeteries Management Plan, Mākara, Karori and Tawa Cemeteries* for the Strategy and Policy Committee to consider in May 2021.

SEWAGE SLUDGE IN LANDFILL WAS PROMISED TO BE A TEMPORARY MEASURE THAT LOOKS TO REMAIN FOR 50 YEARS



What currently happens

- Currently sewage sludge is pumped 10 kilometres to the landfill, with waste water pumped the entire distance back.
- The original plan was to generate compost.
 This was mothballed a few years after commencement.
- Wellington City has limited commitment to waste minimisation.
- The closure of other landfills in the wider Wellington Region, means that Southern Landfill will become an increasing the regional centre for waste.

Why this is a failure of systems

- There was no reason to pump the sewage across the City other than Ōwhiro Bay was an easier target for the environmental impact than Moa Point at the time of the decision.
- The original plan was to turn the sludge to compost. This scheme was stopped in 2009 'for a few months' while new technologies were developed. The entire plant capability is currently moth-balled on site.
- A challenge with the compost was that it did not sell in sufficient quantities. However, if the Council had chosen to use it for their own gardens it would have absorbed much of the production.
- The current system depends mixing rubbish with waste to mix with the sewage sludge at a 1:4 ratio. This means that Council will need to increase waste just to off-set population growth.


